

Government, Public Advocacy, and Judging

Course Title	Course Credits	Course Description
International and ASEAN Jurisprudence	5	This course examines, evaluates, and compares techniques and theories of judging from the jurisprudence from international courts, arbitral tribunals, and national courts in ASEAN. The course is designed to expose national judges to effective methods of adjudicative reasoning and various systems of judicial review across different legal traditions.
Seminar on Adjudication and Arbitration	5	This problem-based practical course focuses on the art, science, and craft of judicial and arbitral decision-making, including various technical and prophylactic rules for the evaluation of evidence; the use of decision tools, experts, and empirical methods; and introduces technological innovations to the research and drafting of judicial decisions and arbitral awards.
International Anti-Corruption Compliance	3	This course focuses on various cross-border, regional, and international laws and instruments aimed at eliminating corruption, such as laws against money laundering, promoting government transparency and freedom of information, laws against organized crime, trade and investment regulations.
Dispute Avoidance and Settlement Tools	3	This course trains government counsels in techniques for negotiation and cooperative settlement, as well as to build effective early detection and dispute avoidance, due diligence, and oversight mechanisms into government transactions that contain foreign elements or involve foreign parties, as a required strategy before resort to more adversarial international dispute settlement procedures such as arbitration and cross-border litigation.

Government, Public Advocacy, and Judging

Government Contracts, Procurement, and Public Policy	5	This course uses a comparative approach (from United States law, English law, EU law, and Southeast Asian laws) to the laws and common principles involved in government contracting, including treaties and national laws on the public procurement of goods and services, and adopts a public policy theoretical lens for evaluating law reforms in government contracting.
International Criminal Law and Transnational Crimes	4	This course examines the body of public law designed to ensure accountability and prevent impunity against perpetrators of serious atrocities, as well as the body of international, comparative, and cross-border treaties and private laws that address transnational crimes.
International Human Rights and Humanitarian Law	4	This course provides an integrated, theoretical and practical case-based approach to the study of the international, regional, and national legal regimes and institutional systems designed to protect individuals and groups in times of peace and times of armed conflict.
International Maritime, Aviation, and Transport Law	5	This introductory course combines the treaties, public and private laws governing and regulating the use of the world's oceans, watercourses, air space and commons, including the analysis of maritime offenses and maritime delimitations, as well as the study of cross-border aviation, shipping, and transportation laws, rules, and regulations.

Government, Public Advocacy, and Judging

International Environmental Law and Policy	3	This course examines international treaties, related laws and soft instruments on environmental protection and sustainability, and also gives focus to incipient and evolving cross-border policies on environmental protection in Southeast Asia through ASEAN case studies.
Legislation and Treaty-Drafting	4	This course introduces government counsels to tools and techniques for the effective drafting, interpretation, evaluation, and review of legislation and treaties.
Governmental and Judicial Ethics	3	This problem-based course applies cross-border and national laws, rules, and principles of professional and public accountability particular to government lawyers, public institutional advisers, sovereign counsels, and judges.
Special Topics in Comparative Public Law and Institutions	3	This seminar introduces students to specific topics emerging in issues of regulation and governmental policymaking, such as the role of government in regulating automation and artificial intelligence, telecommunications and energy sectors, etc. This seminar enables LLM students to access new topics offered by leading professors around the world.
